


# Membership

There is a Yiddish word *menschkeit*. The root word is mensch, which means man. But *menschkeit* is an adjective, which might literally translate into "manship" or "manhood."

Menschkeit does not indicate being a man as a gender, or manhood as a state of adulthood. It does not indicate doing "manly" things like riding the range, roping cattle, or wrestling bears.

Rather, it takes into consideration the things that make a man. . . well, a man. The friend who drops what he's doing on a late Friday night to come over and help with a plumbing emergency would be said to have *menschkeit*. The Lodge Brother who comes by on a Saturday morning with his truck to help another Brother move, asking no thanks or reward for his service would have *menschkeit*.



Robert Davis, 33°, G.C. has written about Manhood and Masonry, and how Freemasonry historically developed the Jungian archetypes of manhood. *Menschkeit*, however, is different than the elements of manhood.

The person with *menschkeit* might better be said to live with a philosophy of doing

the right and decent thing in every situation, of *living on the level* and *acting by the square.* 

A Mason might demonstrate his *menschkeit* by being the kind of Brother who steps up to help another Lodge with Degree work on short notice. He may give up his afternoon to volunteer at a Lodge event, seeking neither recognition or reward. Our Almoner's Fund is an example of this spirit, anonymously helping those in need. When asked why he gave to charity, one Brother responded simply, "Because I can."

Personally, I think of *menschkeit* as the kind of person who goes above and beyond the call of duty. Not just above and beyond once or twice, but as a consistent element of his very being.

multi-talented, with rich vocal harmonies accompanied on a variety of instruments, including the fiddle, guitar, harmonica, and tin whistle.





He attended speech 2-3 times a week for a total of approximately 215 sessions. One of his best times was when his Grandfather (Lucas calls him "Guppy") got to go with him. Lucas also enjoyed bringing his cat stuffed animal "kitty". Holly never missed a beat with Lucas' guests! His big accomplishments were learning to use an augmentative alternative communication (AAC) device to help supplement his speech sounds, making the /p/ sound in sentences, and saying his name, Lucas, with a correct /l/ sound.

Lucas' mother writes, "RiteCare is and was such an important part in Lucas' speech improvement. Although Lucas is unique in his disabilities being a part of the RiteCare family has allowed me to see as a parent that I am not alone in this fight. *Thank you, Holly, Teagan and the RiteCare team!*"

Coon after Tessa was born, we were Itold that she had Down Syndrome. From that moment on, we knew that we would have some challenges that lay ahead when it came to Tessa's physical development, cognitive development, and speech. Early on, the delays in those areas were not very apparent. Tessa actually did not struggle too much when it came to her physical development and kept up with her peers. She was also a pretty bright little girl, so she caught on quickly to many things presented to her. She did not speak very much when she was a toddler or young girl, but we weren't too concerned because we knew she would most likely be delayed in some area, and she was doing so well physically and cognitively that we thought maybe her speech was suffering a bit because she was so focused on those areas.

By the time Tessa was 7, she was still hardly saying any intelligible words. She spoke in her own little language and used different sounds in place of words. At this point we started to realize that maybe something else was going on and began to get a bit concerned. We decided we should look into having Tessa evaluated. A close friend of our family

told us about a speech pathologist named Paul Laikko at the UNMC Munroe Meyer Institute. When Tessa was 7½ years old, Paul evaluated her speech. After his evaluation, he told us that Tessa had speech apraxia and dysarthria.

That was the beginning of our journey with Paul. Tessa began to attend speech therapy sessions with Paul 2-3 times per week free of cost, all thanks to the Scottish Rite Masons. Tessa has been attending speech therapy sessions with Paul year round for the last two years and is absolutely flourishing!

The progress that she has made with Paul is outstanding. He is an amazing speech pathologist who has gotten to know Tessa and found what works best for her. She is not only speaking words, but also speaking in sentences.

We are so incredibly grateful to not only Paul, but also to the Scottish Rite Masons and their support of children with language delays. If it were not for them, Tessa would not be speaking as well as she is today.

Aristotle wrote that developing virtue was done by consistently behaving in the right way until it became a habit. If virtues are formed by action, menschkeit is not a single act, but a habit.

What better way for Masons to display *menschkeit* than by doing that which it is right to do as a matter of habit, and showing our virtuousness through everything we do!
