

Alliance Scottish Rite Awards Three \$2,000 Scholarships

The Alliance Scottish Rite presented three \$2,000 scholarships, which are given over a four year period. Janessa is currently enrolled at Chadron State College. Lane is at the University of Nebraska at Lincoln, as is Thomas. Each student presents a copy of their college transcripts, and the Valley sends them a portion of the scholarship each year. Our students reported GPAs of 4.0, 3.4, and 3.75.



Janessa was Honored Queen of Job's Daughters. Lane was a DeMolay (and received a \$2,000/year scholarship from the Supreme Council for the Order of DeMolay). We certainly don't require our scholarship recipients to be in our Masonic youth orders or to have a higher GPA, but we expect more of them, and our Masonic youth scholarship recipients continue to make us proud!



On a sadder note, the Alliance Public Schools lost a grant to furnish school lunches, so Community Table anticipates an increase from 120 to 200 people per day. I am proud that Community Table is able to meet the increased demand. I am working to hire someone to refinish the floor in the kitchen, which has received greater wear and tear with our Community Table caterers. The Lincoln Valley started serious consideration of repairing the parking lot in the Fall of 2018, but with 40 paid parking spots used each day it was difficult to coordinate a time to do the work. Most of our paid parking are State of Nebraska employees.

With the quarantine during COVID-19, many of our parkers are now working from home and we only have about four or five cars in the lot each day. We decided this was a good time to get the work done. Fortunately the contractor had some open time and the State of Nebraska allowed our remaining parkers to use the state lot just north of the Scottish Rite during construction.

The work was done by America's Pavement Maintenance Specialist (APMS). The project started on April 27, 2020, and was completed on May 1, 2020. The total cost for the project was \$50,476.00, though avoiding the giant pothole in the middle of the lot is priceless! The work should be good for at least 12 to 15 years.

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WalkRite for RiteCare Hosted as a 'Virtual' Walk at Lake Zorinsky

With social distancing, the quarantine, and the COVID-19 pandemic, events have had to adapt to changing circumstances. The annual WalkRite for RiteCare was no exception, and was redesigned for social distancing.

It was held on Saturday, June 27, 2020 at Lake Zorinsky, but the RiteCare Clinicians created a virtual walk so families, particularly with vulnerable children, could stay in their car. They stopped at the first station to pick up a scavenger hunt flier, WalkRite t-shirts, and donate. As they drove through Lake Zorinsky, the children would mark off items they saw as their families made a loop around the park in their cars: the bubble station, a T-Rex (Clinician Beth Hughes' daughter Jane in costume), the RiteCare Clinicians, bumblebee and a ladybug signs, and other items. On their way out, the Clinicians gave them a goody bag with a few treats.

Besides the RiteCare Clinicians from the UNMC Munroe-Meyer Institute, we welcomed the women from the Nebraska Student Speech-Language Hearing Association (NSSLHA), speech pathology majors at the University of Nebraska at Omaha who volunteer each year.

OPEN FOR BUSINESS

Speech Pathologists Kris Althouse and Sydney Norton in the Hastings RiteCare Clinic recently submitted a plan to re-open the RiteCare Clinic in the Hastings Masonic Center for speech therapy.

To get back to work, they will stagger days they are in the Clinic to decrease number of people and support social distancing in the office.

Masks will be worn and replaced each day. Some toys and the bean bag have been removed from the waiting area, and some of the toys in the Clinic have been moved to reduce the number of toys that need to be cleaned after each session. Communication with Masons will take place between the glass window in the waiting area, and the Clinicians will have a no-touch thermometer, cloth masks, safety goggles and cleaning wipes. Only one family member will be allowed with a patient, and guardians will call the Clinic when they arrive. Clinicians will perform a screening and take a child's temperature at the car or meet the family at the door. Speech-Language Pathology student supervision will resume in the Fall.

In addition, they continue to meet with some families via telepractice, providing the same level of care they would in person. Many families have even preferred this method, leading to less cancellations or no-shows in the Clinics.

Kris and Sydney are confident that these new procedures will allow the Clinic to operate safely, so they can offer therapy for children in greater-Hastings.

About the RiteCare Scottish Rite Childhood Language Program

Most of us have heard about RiteCare however, do we really know the story. RiteCare Scottish Rite Childhood Language Program (SRCLP) clinics provide diagnostic evaluation and treatment of speech and language disorders, as well as learning disabilities.

Here in Nebraska, we work with the UNMC Munroe-Meyer Institute and the University of Nebraska. Your donations provide for over 400 children annually to receive treatment throughout the state of Nebraska thru in person clinic seasons and via telemedicine.

Children who might have remained educationally behind for a lifetime can now talk, read, and lead productive lives. More importantly we give children the ability to say, "I love you Mommy and Daddy."

Scholarship and Education Programs

On a national level, our scholarship programs are going through a transition period, introducing a new program that will provide scholarships to individuals with ties to Masonry. Individuals or groups can donate \$1,000 and name a scholarship for 1 year or permanently endow a scholarship with a donation of \$50,000. In Nebraska, Scottish Rite Masons provide 17

scholarships to students. We also recognize teachers for their outstanding work.

Disaster Relief

Through the Scottish Rite Foundation, SJ, USA, Inc., the Supreme Council provides direct relief to disaster victims and works with other Masonic groups to provide additional assistance.

Rebuilding the Temple Campaign

The Rebuilding the Temple Campaign (RTC) is a multi-million dollar fundraising effort that supports the necessary rehabilitation goals for the House of the Temple and the 21st-century renovation plans that have been put into place for the future of the headquarters building. Since opening to the public in 1915, millions of brethren and visitors have come to the Temple, located in the heart of Washington, D.C., to view the ceremonial rooms, treasured symbols, ancient books, and prized artifacts. The RTC is a fundraising campaign of the House of the Temple Historic Preservation Foundation, Inc., which is a non-profit Virginia corporation recognized as a tax-exempt public charity under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended. Its tax identification number is 52-1664576. Contributions to the House of the Temple Historic Preservation Foundation, Inc. and the RTC are tax-deductible to the extent allowed by the law.
