a RiteCare vision for the future

Recently, Scottish Rite Masons received the annual appeal for the 101-Club, which supports RiteCare speech therapy services for children through the Scottish Rite Foundation of Nebraska.

Last year, this appeal raised \$15,868, the equivalent of 158 sessions of therapy for children. 21 Brethren stepped up as SGIG Society donors, giving \$300 or more for the year, which equals the cost of 3 sessions of speech therapy for a child.

In all, Nebraska Scottish Rite Masons underwrote 3,586 sessions of therapy in 2022 for 520 children. Scottish Rite Masons will donate an estimated \$814,675 to provide these services at RiteCare Clinics at the University of


